



Shaping the public policy sphere

GENDER

Children of Female Prisoners is running an advocacy campaign to raise awareness of families with incarcerated mothers, and has submitted a proposal to Egypt's parlaiment to find alternative punishments for debt, a leading cause.

TRANSPORTATION

Transport for Cairo has been invited to meet with government officials to help develop Cairo's new mass transit system.

DIFFERENTLY -ABLED PEOPLE

Alhassan Foundation is

raising awareness of public space accessibility for wheelchair users, and has inspired a ministry of education initiative on school accessibility.

RANA DAJANI, FOUNDER, WE LOVE READING

A native of Jordan, Rana Dajani started We Love Reading after returning home upon completing a PhD in the United States, where her two young daughters had benefited from a local library reading program. She noticed that such programs didn't exist in Jordan, and decided to do something about it.



COUNTRIES WHERE PROGRAM HAS BEEN REPLICATED






Reinventing education in Egypt

MOSTAFA SHAHAT, FOUNDER, NAFHAM

Mostafa Shahat founded **NAFHAM** as a startup in 2012 with the vision of bringing free online education to grade school students across Egypt. NAFHAM now helps fill the enormous gap created by a severe shortage of funding for public schools, where Egypt's growing population of children fill overcrowded classrooms, attend short lessons in multiple shifts, and face a high likelihood of dropping out early.

NAFHAM now attracts more than 700,000 unique users each month and has spread to students in four other Arab countries.

Kamal Mouzawak founded Souk El Tayeb in 2004 as an experimental farmers market featuring produce from small-scale farmers and producers. It has since grown into a mature organization working at the national and international level to promote and preserve culinary traditions, rural heritage and the natural environment.




Building an empowering space for women
